### Role of criminal law in society

- To deter unwanted behavior
- To punish or rehabilitate people who perform harmful acts

### Role of the Singapore Police Force

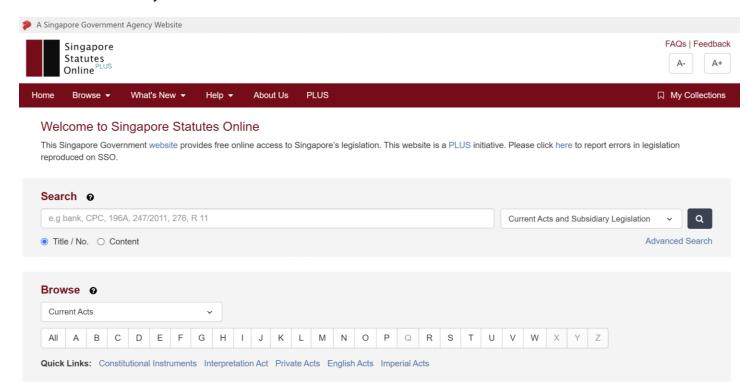
- To prevent, deter and detect crime
- To enforce and uphold the law

# | Basic Introduction to Criminal Law

### **Statutes**

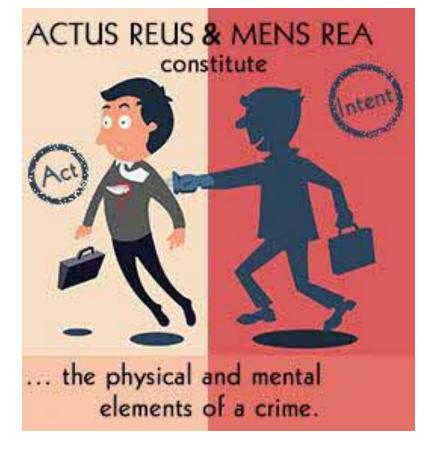
Offences can be found in statutes (written law). If there is no statute, there is no offence. For crimes, the main statute would be the Penal Code.

### Two elements to every crime:

Physical element The Act



Mental element

The Intention

# The physical element of the crime

### Act:

An action that causes harm, loss, or damage

Stealing someone's wallet

### **Omission:**

Failing to do
something, resulting
in harm, loss or
damage

A lifeguard not saving a drowning person

### The mental element of the crime

### **Intention:**

Having the clear objective of carrying out one's action.

A purposely stabs B in the chest, intending to kill B.

### **Knowledge:**

Knowing that one's actions would result in harm but still doing it.

A puts nuts in B's food, knowing that B was allergic (but not intending to kill him).

### Negligence:

Not doing what was expected of oneself which results in harm to others.

A texts while driving and causes an accident, without intending or knowing an accident would happen.

# There can be NO CRIME without physical & mental elements

Example: Section 378, Penal Code

### **Theft**

378. Whoever, <u>intending to take</u> dishonestly any movable property out of the possession of any person without that person's consent, <u>moves that</u> <u>property</u> in order to such taking, is said to commit theft.

# Teen who tossed infant from winders may be let off

- >> Originally charged with infanticide
- >> Charge reduced as baby was stillborn

THE teenage girl who faced life in prison for infanticide, because she threw her day-old baby from her HDB block, may not even be jailed.

Instead, Hafshah Ausari, 17, could be given no more than three years' probation, as an autopsy report showed the infant was dead when it was disposed of. Dr Lai Stang Hui of the Health Sciences Authority certified that the baby girl was stillborn.

Yesterday, Hafshah pleaded guilty to the lesser charge of "concealment of birth by the secret disposal of the dead body".

On Nov 29 last year, the teen felt pain in her abdomen at around companied her father to pick up her mother before going to see a doctor.

Her parents, who are both in their early 40s, made the medical appointment after she admitted to her dad she was pregnant, as they suspected, earlier that day.

They had confronted her with their suspicions four days earlier. But Hafshah denied it and left the house, returning home only on Nov 29 at about 9am.

In mitigation, her lawyer, Mr R.S. Bajwa, said Hafshah was a very young girl. The only girl in her family, she had kept the pregnancy to herself because she felt she had no one to turn to, he added.

Her father is a taxi driver, and nother a factory worker. She has three brothers, aged six, 13 and 21.

### Mental element

**Intending** to take the victim's property out of their possession without their permission

# Physical element

**Taking** the victim's property without their permission

What does **POSSESSION** mean? What constitutes **PERMISSION**?



# | Theft

("Theft"; Section 378, Penal Code)

# Example 1

To play a prank, A takes V's phone without asking him, and does not return it even after V realises it is missing.

## Example 2

A takes V's money without asking him, because A forgot to bring his own and needs money to buy food.



# | Online Scams

("Cheating"; Section 415 – 420A, Penal Code)

At least 960 in Singapore lost over \$538k in 10 weeks to Taylor Swift concert ticket scams

Scam victims in S'pore lost \$651.8m in 2023, with record high of over 46,000 cases reported

\$167,000 lost to online scams through fake Facebook, Instagram ads since September 2023: Police

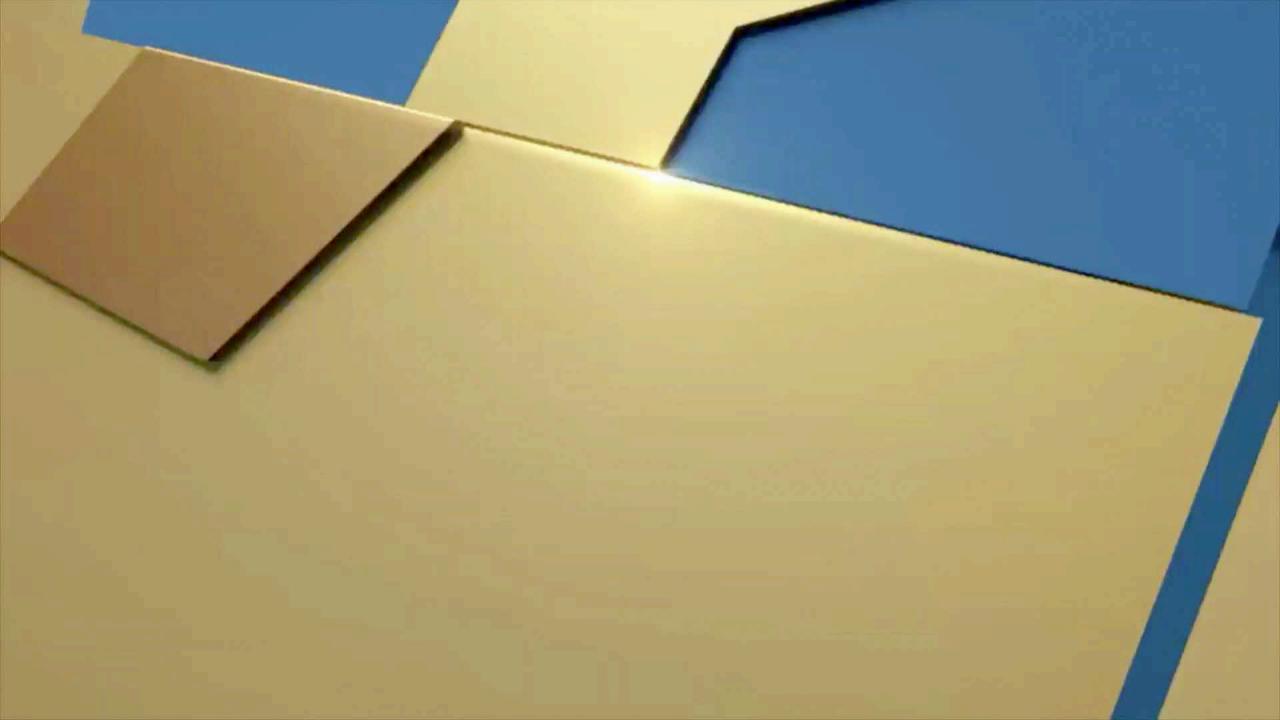

# Online Scams

("Cheating"; Section 415 – 420A, Penal Code)

**420.** Whoever cheats and thereby dishonestly induces the person deceived to deliver or cause the delivery of any property to any person, or to make, alter or destroy the whole or any part of a valuable security, or anything which is signed or sealed, and which is capable of being converted into a valuable security, shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to 10 years, and shall also be liable to fine.



# Online Scams

("Cheating"; Section 415 – 420A, Penal Code)

# Physical element

**Inducing** the person deceived to deliver or cause the delivery of any property to any person

### Mental element

**Dishonestly** doing the act and with the **intention** of inducing the person deceived to deliver or cause the delivery of any property to any person

# Crimes Against The Person

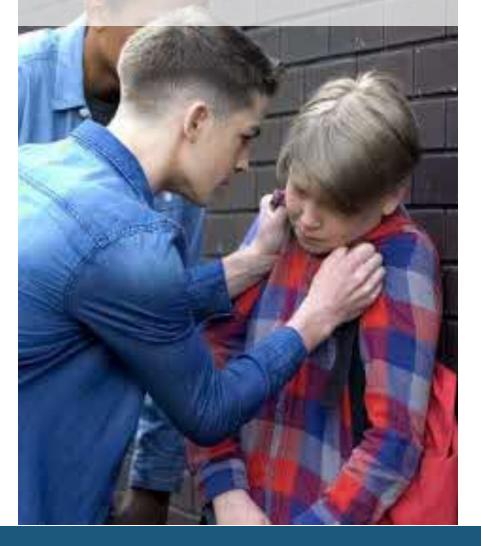
Bullying
Outrage of Modesty
Murder

("Intentionally causing harassment, alarm or distress"; Section 3, Protection from Harassment Act)



- 3.—(1) An individual or entity must not, with intent to cause harassment, alarm or distress
- to another person, by any means —
- (a) use any threatening, abusive or insulting words or behaviour;
- (b) make any threatening, abusive or insulting communication; or
- (c) publish any identity information of the target person or a related person of the target person,
- and as a result <u>causing the target person or any</u> <u>other person harassment, alarm or distress</u>.

("Intentionally causing harassment, alarm or distress"; Section 3, Protection from Harassment Act)



### Mental element

Intending to cause harassment, alarm or distress to the victim

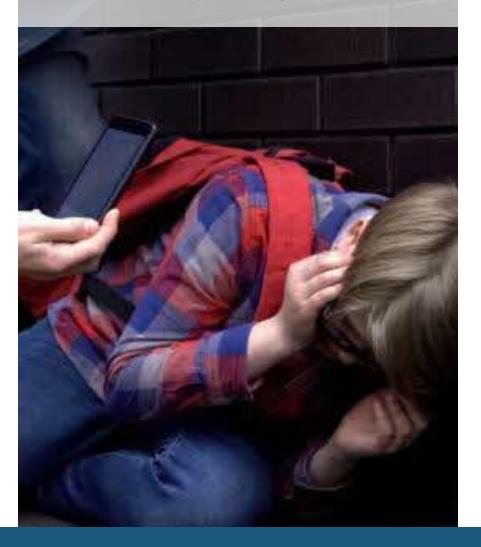
## Physical element

Using/making threatening, abusive or insulting

- I. Words/behavior towards the victim OR
- II. Communication to the victim

What is considered **THREATENING**, **ABUSIVE or INSULTING** behaviour?

("Intentionally causing harassment, alarm or distress"; Section 3, Protection from Harassment Act)



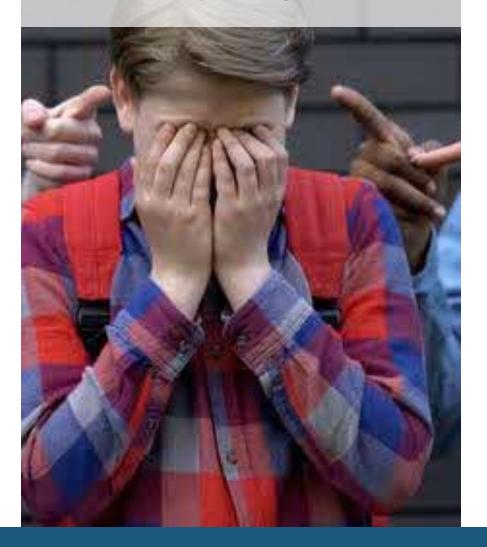
## Example 1

V is overweight, and A knows V is very insecure. A makes fun of V for eating a lot, intending to cause distress to V.

## Example 2

A wants V to feel scared, so A sends V a violent picture which he knows will alarm V.

("Intentionally causing harassment, alarm or distress"; Section 3, Protection from Harassment Act)



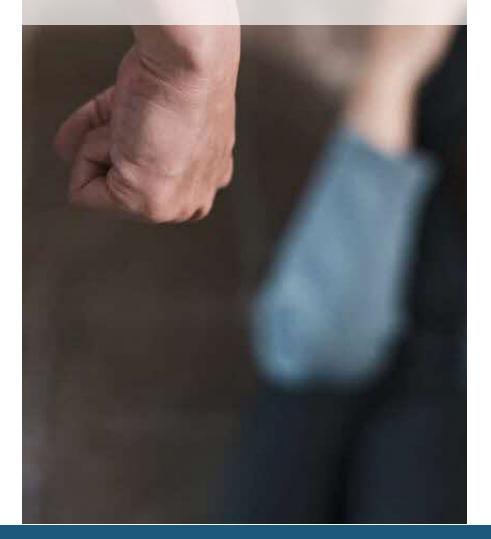
# Example 3

A and V are classmates. A posts hurtful things about V on a website accessible to all of their classmates. V sees it, and gets distressed.

Did A commit intentional bullying?

# Causing Fear

("Fear, provocation or facilitation of violence"; Section 5, Protection from Harassment Act)



### Mental element

Intending to cause the victim to believe that violence will be used, OR
Knowing that the victim will likely believe that violence will be used

# Physical element

Using/making threatening, abusive or insulting

- I. Words/behavior towards the victim OR
- II. Communication to the victim

# Causing Fear

("Fear, provocation or facilitation of violence"; Section 5, Protection from Harassment Act)



# Example 1

A picks up a stick and waves it at V in a threatening way.

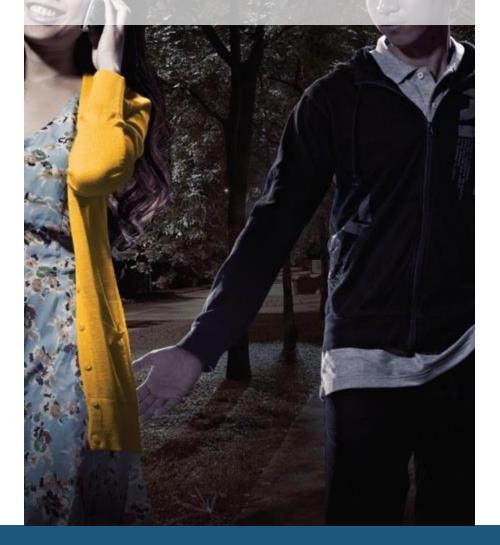
# Example 2

A sends a text message to V, telling V that he wants to beat V's friend up.

# Outrage of Modesty

("Assault or use of criminal force to a person with intent to outrage modesty"; Section 354(1), Penal Code)



354.—(1) Whoever assaults or uses criminal force to any person, intending to outrage or knowing it to be likely that he will thereby outrage the modesty of that person, shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to 3 years, or with fine, or with caning, or with any combination of such punishments.

# Outrage of Modesty

("Assault or use of criminal force to a person with intent to outrage modesty"; Section 354(1), Penal Code)



### Mental element

**Intending** to outrage the modesty of the victim, OR

**Knowing** that the victim's modesty will likely be outraged

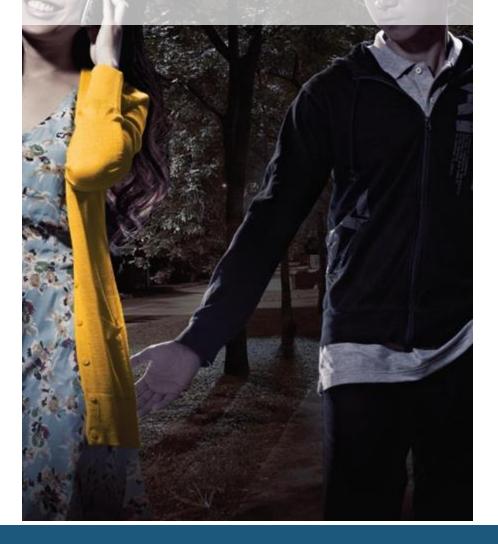
## Physical element

Causing the victim to believe that they will be touched in sensitive areas without permission; OR Using criminal force on the victim (touch the victim)

What is a **SENSITIVE AREA**? What is **PERMISSION**?

# Outrage of Modesty

("Assault or use of criminal force to a person with intent to outrage modesty"; Section 354(1), Penal Code)



## Example 1

In a crowded MRT, Tom stood near Jane, and his hand bumped into Jane's waist.

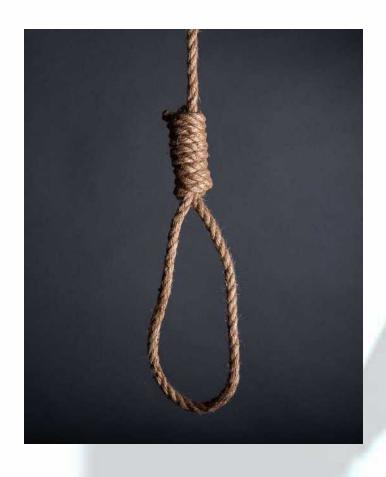
However, Tom did not actually intend to touch Jane, nor did he know he was likely to.

Did Tom commit an outrage of modesty?

What other offences are committed if someone exposes their private parts to the public or takes upskirt photos?

# Causing Death

("Culpable homicide"; Section 299, Penal Code)



### General information

Culpable homicide is defined as the act of causing death, (1) with the intention of causing death, or (2) with the intention of causing such bodily injury as is likely to cause death, or (3) with the knowledge that he is likely by such act to cause death.

What is the difference between **CULPABLE HOMICIDE** and **MURDER**?

# Murder

("Murder"; Section 300, Penal Code)



300. Except in the cases hereinafter excepted culpable homicide is murder —
(a) if the act [...] done with the intention of causing death

Doesn't this sound similar to Section 299?

Section 300(a) – 300(d) essentially mirror Section 299. Which one the accused gets charged under may depend on various factors.

# Murder

("Murder"; Section 300, Penal Code)



### Prosecutorial discretion

Causing death with the intention of causing death can cause a person to be liable for both culpable homicide and murder.

The prosecution can decide what to charge the accused with. While they are generally not required to give their reasons for such decisions, some considerations include a lack of evidence, the accused showing remorse, or the accused agreeing to plead guilty for a lower charge.



The main actor is the one who commits the offence.

The abettor is the one who helps out or encourages the main culprit.

# Abetment - Aiding

("Abetment of the doing of a thing"; Penal Code s107(c))



Intending to help the main actor carry out an act

# Physical element

Helping the main actor to carry out an act, which amounts to a crime

Must the abettor **KNOW** what exactly he is helping out with? What if he didn't know that it was a crime?



# Abetment - Instigation

("Abetment of the doing of a thing"; Penal Code s107(a))



### Mental element

Intending to encourage or tell the main actor to do something

# Physical element

Encouraging or telling the main actor to do something, which amounts to a crime

What if the main actor did **SOMETHING ELSE**, or did not do anything at all?
